# Covid-19: what we know

This new virus is highly infectious and affects some people with particular ferocity. Currently over 25 million people have been officially tested positive globally and nearly 850,000 have died according to the John Hopkins University tracking website. Both figures are believed to be an underestimate because of limited testing and poor records.

There is no vaccine or cure for Covid-19, however, vaccine trials are taking place. Two current drugs may reduce severe symptoms: dexamethasone and remdesivir.

The key symptoms to watch out for include a persistent cough, a high

temperature and a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste. Most people get one of these symptoms. If you or a member of your household symptoms get show tested immediately and stay at home along with the rest of your household and social bubble and do not have visitors. If the test is positive you and your household and social bubble must self-isolate. The person with the symptoms must self-isolate for 10 days while other household and social bubble members should do so for 14 days.

Use friends, family and voluntary groups to bring your medicines, food and other items and leave them on your doorstep. Seek help and advice from NHS 111 telephone service.

To reduce the spread of the coronavirus everyone must wash hands regularly, cover your nose and mouth with a fresh tissue (not hands) if coughing or sneezing, avoid touching your nose, mouth and eyes and socially distance from everyone you do not live with or outside your social bubble by 2 metres (6 feet). If you cannot socially distance by this distance you should wear a face covering.

Face coverings are mandatory in shops, NHS premises, banks, post offices, public transport and in most indoor places where you will meet others, such as, places of worship, museums, hotels, village halls. libraries. cinemas. hair salons. barbers and professional services (legal, financial, etc). A face covering will reduce the risk of droplet transmission

# Dogs can mean betterbehaved children

s your child naughty? Consider getting a dog.

A recent study has found that children who grow up with a dog are far more likely to be willing to share and help others.

Researchers at the University of Western Australia in Perth have found that young children who live with a dog and who frequently interact with family members who interact with the pet dog are far less likely to be naughty or uncooperative.

Small children who are taken for a dog walk with their parents and siblings at least once a week even show a 30 per cent drop in being naughty and disruptive, and a 40 per cent drop in falling-out with friends.

"Dogs help children learn about responsibility and unconditional loyalty. But they can also help with language development and verbal skills, while promoting trust and empathy." Say the researchers. Their study was published in the journal *Paediatric Research.* 

# Getting back to work?

When he had agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. Matthew 20:2

For many of us it is time to get back to the workplace, as restrictions are easing. But can we be forced to go back to the workplace if we are concerned about how safe it is?

Many employment contracts include a requirement for the employee to work at a specific place and during a certain time. Most people are entitled to written terms of employment and this would include information on where to work. Refusing to turn up for work could lead to disciplinary action. The coronavirus epidemic has changed things, so that now an employee is entitled to ask questions about how safe the workplace is.

If you have concerns about going back to work, you should speak to your employer about them. These issues might include worries about using public transport, worries with childcare or other caring responsibilities and how safe the work place is.

Employers have a duty of care towards employees, to look after both their physical and mental health, to comply with equalities legislation and not discriminate against those who have protected characteristics, such as a disability. Under the government's COVID-19 return to the office guidance, all businesses have a duty to conduct a COVID-19 risk assessment. You can ask what has been considered to make the workplace a safe place.

Some employees have a right to ask about flexible working hours, such as coming in before or after the rush hour or working some days at home. You must give reasons and you should consider any compromise if it is refused. The employer is entitled to say no if there is a good business reason.

The point kev is what is 'reasonable'. Your employer will want to get back to normal business and it is in everyone's interest to productive successful have а business.

As always this is a light-hearted guide to a complex subject and always get professional advice.

t is with delight that I can inform everyone that services have been well received since their reintroduction in our churches, and

it has been a delight to be able to share in an act of worship which at the same time was being followed by all those who were not able to join us in church at this time.

As the social distancing and the hygiene requirements have all proved to be both acceptable and not too intrusive to worship I believe the time is now right to move one step closer to restoring further Worship provision.

Holy Communion services using the Red Books will now recommence across the benefice along with the provision of Morning Worship using the Green Books. For those unable to join us in church, I will continue to provide my current format of Morning Worship online together with my reflections.

I will be introducing Holy Communion gradually, beginning with a service at Holland Fen at 10.45am on 13<sup>th</sup> September. Holy Communion will then be offered at Sibsey at 10.30am on 20<sup>th</sup> September.

In order to ensure the safe delivery of the Sacrament at this time, Communion will be offered in one kind only, with the Priest being the only person to consume the wine on behalf of the people.

To prevent unnecessary movement especially in some of our smaller churches, the priest will come to the people in their seats and gently drop the Sacrament onto the open hands of those wishing to receive.

Those who do not wish to do so simply keep their hands down, this will be done in silence.

Once the communicant has received the Sacrament they may then release their facemask

Please do remember to resanitize your hands as you leave the building following the end of the service.

# Now even more plastic

There is growing concern in the Government, among campaigners, and among scientists over how coronavirus has sparked an increase in single-use plastics.

Not only are millions of disposable masks and gloves now 'out there', but there has been also a huge increase in disposable cutlery, sachets and containers.

One study by UCL estimates that in the UK alone, if every person used a single-use face mask every day for a year, it would create an additional 66,000 tonnes of contaminated waste, and 57,000 tonnes of plastic packaging.

Two environment ministers, Lord Goldsmith and Rebecca Pow, have said: "We are actively thinking across the Government and NHS whether we can safely reuse PPE and we are aware of other countries who have begun looking at the potential to decontaminate and reuse it."

Scientists warn that it could take up to 500 years for polypropylene face masks to degrade. Meanwhile, according to some estimates, 129billion masks and 65billion plastic gloves are being used each month worldwide.

# VJ Day 75 Celebrations -15th August 2020

The Villagers of Kirton Holme celebrated VJ Day 75 with a game of croquet on the green whilst maintaining social distancing.

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# Louis Pasteur – 'father' of microbiology

A tiny invisible thing that brings disease and death .... where have we heard that before?! But Louis Pasteur, who died 125 years ago this month, on 28<sup>th</sup> September 1895, was not interested in a virus from China, but in tiny living organisms that brought disease and death in other ways.

Pasteur made some outstanding breakthroughs. He discovered the principles of vaccination, and then created the first vaccines for anthrax and rabies. His medical discoveries provided support for the germ theory of disease and nullified the theory of spontaneous generation.

But Louis Pasteur is best known for his invention of the technique of treating milk and wine to stop bacterial contamination, a process that was named after him: pasteurisation. In doing so, he saved the French beer, wine and silk industries.

All in all, this gifted French biologist, microbiologist, and chemist well deserves his title as the 'father of microbiology,' and to be seen as one of the three main founders of bacteriology.

# The Diaspora Churches

The 'Diaspora' Churches is a new name for what have previously been called 'Overseas National Churches'. The Global Connections network of Christian organisations is now using this new and clearer name – Diaspora Churches.

There are dozens of different denominations which could be included under such a heading. The forthcoming new edition of UK Church Statistics lists:

- 33 different national Catholic Churches in the Diocese of Westminster alone, as well as others serving wider afield.
- 16 different Lutheran denominations, mostly based in England, but some, like the Finnish, German, Latvian, Norwegian and Polish, have work in other parts of the UK as well.
- At least 26 nationalities represented by Asian or non-British White countries
- Huge numbers of black congregations from many African and Caribbean countries.
- 24 different Orthodox denominations each focussing on a particular nationality.
- Over 100 languages spoken.

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# When the sun goes edgewise – and daytime equals night

2<sup>3rd</sup> September is the autumnal northern hemisphere) or the vernal (Spring) equinox (if you live in the southern hemisphere) The equinoxes occur in March and September, when the Sun is 'edgewise' to the Earth's axis of rotation, so that everywhere on earth has twelve hours of daylight and twelve hours of darkness.

# Bring back hedgerows

We need our hedgerows back – urgently. They are part of 'nature's toolbox' to help us reduce our carbon emissions.

That was the recent message from the CPRE countryside charity which points out that there were twice as many hedges in England before the Second World War. Since then thousands of kilometres of hedges have been ripped up to make way for new housing and motorways, and to merge and enlarge fields.

The 2007 UK Countryside Survey found that there were 600,000 kilometres of managed and unmanaged hedgerows in the UK, with the vast majority of them in England.

This was a significant decline on the same survey from 1984, when there were about 680,000 kilometres of hedges across Great Britain. That is a reduction of 80,000 kilometres, or 50,000 miles. To put that another way, we have ripped out about 57,000 times the entire length of Britain (874 miles).

No wonder, then, that the CPRE's report, *Greener, better, faster: countryside solutions to the climate emergency and for a green recovery*, calls for millions of pounds to be spent on new hedges. It says: "By planting more trees and hedgerow, restoring peatlands and moving toward a more sustainable way of farming, we can use nature's toolbox to capture greenhouse gases from the air, while revitalising our natural environment."

# Celebrating 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the voyage of the *Mayflower*

If we find it difficult to cross the Atlantic just now, it was even worse 400 years this month. On 6<sup>th</sup> September 1620, 102 determined Puritans climbed on board the *Mayflower* and set sail from Plymouth. They had 30 crew to steer them across 3000 miles of open, perilous ocean.

Those Puritans, or 'Pilgrim fathers', could never have dreamed that their journey would become one of the most influential in world history. Their courage and purpose for the voyage would help shape the very history and culture of the USA.

The Pilgrim fathers themselves were in search of religious freedom and a new life. Years before they had rejected the Church of England, due to its Roman Catholic past, and in 1608 they had moved to Holland (some from Lincolnshire initially imprisoned in Boston in 1607), where they could worship freely. But life was very hard there, and so the New World beckoned to them.

They had originally intended to use two ships, but the *Speedwell* sprang a leak shortly after sailing, and so they crowded as many as possible into the *Mayflower*. After a long and difficult 10 weeks at sea, they reached America, but could not reach their intended destination, Virginia, because of heavy seas. They finally landed in Provincetown Harbor, Cape Cod, Massachusetts on 11<sup>th</sup> November.



That presented the next great challenge: the bitter, harsh winter of Massachu

setts. Half of the Pilgrims perished that first winter, of hunger and cold. Without the help of the local Indigenous peoples to teach them food-gathering and other survival skills, all of the colony would probably have perished.

After months of hard work, by the 'Fall' of 1621 the tiny colony had its first harvest. They celebrated this great achievement with their new Indigenous friends. It became Thanksgiving. The Pilgrims had been convinced that God wanted them to go to the New World. They wrote: "We verily believe and trust the Lord is with us, and that He will graciously prosper our endeavours according to the simplicity of our hearts therein."

The Mayflower was one of the earliest pilgrim vessels, and so became a cultural icon in the history of the United States. This year, until coronavirus put a stop to things, many celebrations in the USA, England and the Netherlands had been planned.

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# Music and memory

Have you ever heard a certain song or tune that immediately takes you back to your youth? It can be a very poignant moment.

When researchers at the University of Westminster examined the choices of 80 different guests on the BBC radio show *Desert Island Discs*, they found that most guests had chosen music which dated back to when they had been between 10 to 30 years old. This time span was identified as a 'selfdefining period' in their lives.

The research concluded: "The music we know and love between the ages of 10 to 30 will play a significant role throughout our lives, connecting us as individuals to other people, places and times that become central to our identity."

# What to eat when you drive

Here is a way of staying awake at the wheel on those long motorway drives: avoid heavy foods such as hamburgers, chips and cakes. They only encourage drowsiness, which accounts for 23 per cent of fatal car crashes, according to France's motorway companies. Instead, choose a meal high in water content, with some bitterness and acidity to round it off. For example, how about: some radishes, a lentil dish, and then kiwi fruit and dark chocolate, washed down with water? This sort of meal has a low glycaemic index, which means there is no sugar rush followed by a drop in your alertness.

The idea is based on research done by the French insurers' federation Assurance Prevention.

# The story behind ... ABIDE WITH ME

One of the most famous hymns in the world came out of Brixham, near Torbay, Devon, in 1847.

In those days it was a poor, obscure fishing village, and the vicar was the Rev Henry Francis Lyte. It was a discouraging place to be a pastor, but Henry felt that God wanted him there, and so he stayed, though it was lonely work, and he suffered constant ill health.

By the time he was 54, Henry had contracted tuberculosis and asthma, and he and his family knew he was dying. It would have been so easy for him to look back on his life and feel a complete failure.

What had he ever much accomplished? And yet – and yet – Henry knew that in life it is not worldly success that matters, but how much we respond to Jesus Christ, and how much we follow Him.

In September of 1847 Henry was preparing to travel to the south of France, as was the custom for people with tuberculosis at that time. One day before he left, he read the story in the gospel of Luke about the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. They were met by the dav Jesus on of His resurrection, and they invited Him to stay with them because it was getting late. "Abide with us", they said "for it is towards evening."

"Abide with us - for it is toward evening." These words struck a chord with Henry, who knew that it was getting 'towards evening' in his life. So, he sat down and wrote this hymn as a prayer to God – (the following are just some of the verses)

#### Abide with me

Abide with me; fast falls the eventide; The darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide! When other helpers fail and comforts flee,

Help of the helpless, O abide with me.

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day;

Earth's joys grow dim; its glories pass away;

Change and decay in all around I see;

O Thou who changest not, abide with me.

I fear no foe, with Thee at hand to bless;

Ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness.

Where is death's sting? Where, grave, thy victory? I triumph still, if Thou abide with me.

Shortly after Henry wrote that hymn, he preached his last sermon. He was so ill he practically crawled into the pulpit to do so. A few weeks later, in Nice, France, he died, and so of course he never knew that his hymn would go on to become greatly loved the world over.

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# **High Toynton Church**



After the church tower collapsed in January 2020 fundraising continues. Scaffolding and corrugated iron hoardings now enclose large parts of the building.

# Gorse – cheerful and perfumed, but prickly!

The old saying 'Kissing is out of season when the gorse is not in bloom' is based on the fact that it is a rare time of year when a flower or two cannot be found. The bush itself, growing on heaths and moors is

well-known for its vicious spikes. This is its answer to the problem of producing leaves that will withstand wind, rain and hungry animals.

The golden yellow flowers are at their absolute best in

spring when the bushes, growing often to a height of seven to ten feet, seem to glow in the countryside. They attract bees and other pollenseeking insects and many of us enjoy the rich coconut-like perfume as well as the joyful colour. The sharp foliage gives protection to several species of bird as they nest deep in these bulging bushes, and larger animals such as sheep and cows, if grazing nearby, will take advantage of gorse as a very effective windbreak.

In the past, gorse, also known as 'furze' or 'whin', was used as fuel as it burns very readily when dry. This has caused many serious moorland fires in recent years, but gorse is fortunately a resilient species and quickly sends up new shoots from the burnt stumps that remain. It is also apparently somewhat susceptible to frost, but will recover quickly with new growth.

A member of the pea family, its seeds are set in brown, somewhat unattractive pods, which on a hot summer's day can be heard popping, or they may be provoked into doing

so when held in a hot hand. However, what might surprise us even more is that in the past, in country districts, it was used for drying washing, as the thorns would allow nothing to escape, even in the strongest



of winds!

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# **Take control! Make a Lasting Power of Attorney**

The corona virus (Covid-19) has certainly changed the way in which we live our day to day lives and made a strange new world for all of us. During these unprecedented times, the need to have a Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA) in place is even more vital.

An LPA is all about you choosing individuals who you trust completely (usually a family member or close friend) to make decisions for you, particularly when you can't, or when communicating them would be an issue, or mobility or access to services would be challenging for you. Therefore, an LPA is super useful when you need one.

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
